	<p>The number of fentanyl related overdoses is heartbreaking. What can be done? 4:15 pm – 5:15 pm	<p><b>Are the Duties of a State Attorney General Always Consistent with the Model Rules of Professional Conduct?</b></p> <p>All lawyers must adhere to their state’s Rules of Professional Conduct, e.g. “the Model Rules.” Failure to comply can result in severe sanctions including a revocation of a lawyer’s license. Because the Model Rules are designed for the private practice of law, they can be inconsistent with the requirements of government lawyering.
