## Re: <u>State Attorneys General Urge Robust Funding for Legal</u> <u>Services Corporation</u>

Dear Chair Granger, Ranking Member DeLauro, Chair Rogers, and Ranking Member Cartwright:

As state attorneys general, we have joined together across party lines to respectfully request that you prioritize investment in the Legal Services Corporation (LSC) in the Fiscal Year 2024 Commerce, Justice, Science, and Related Agencies Appropriations bill. Investment in LSC is essential to ensuring that communities across our nation have access to critically needed civil legal services. In the 1974 Legal Services Corporation Act that established LSC, Congress acknowledged the profound inequities in access to civil justice and observed that *"providing legal assistance to those who face an economic barrier to adequate legal counsel will serve best the ends of justice and assist in improving opportunities for low-income persons."* LSC carries out this important mission by distributing over 90% of its total funding to independent nonprofit legal aid programs that provide civil legal assistance to residents in every state, territory, and congressional district. Indeed, formal assessments and compliance reviews of grants confirm that LSC's impactful work provides high quality legal assistance to those who would otherwise be unable to afford legal counsel. The services delivered by LSC's grantees include legal assistance to victims of natural disasters and legal counsel to under-resourced Americans:

- In June 2022, LSC awarded \$38 million in grants to 19 legal aid organizations in 14 states and territories: Alabama, California, Florida, Iowa, Kentucky, Louisiana, New Jersey, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Texas, and Puerto Rico. The legal services made possible by this funding were an essential component of comprehensive disaster relief in devastated communities. Specifically, LSC-funded grantees helped people to repair and stay in their homes, obtain key identification documents, apply for benefits, file insurance claims, access the FEMA process, and more.
- In August 2022, LSC awarded grants totaling \$4.75 million to 15 legal aid organizations in 11 states and territories: Alaska, California, Georgia, Illinois, Louisiana, Massachusetts, Michigan, Nevada, Ohio, Wisconsin, and the U.S. Virgin Islands. LSC's Pro Bono Innovation Fund provides competitive awards to grantees that partner with local attorneys, businesses, and programs to provide pro bono legal services to low-income residents in need of everyday legal assistance, including protection of their rights against debt collectors, representation in eviction proceedings, and safeguarding of their homes from bank foreclosure, to name just a few. Crucially, this program also helps to fill the justice gaps created by legal deserts across our nation.

The powerful impact of LSC's work cannot be overstated, particularly in rural areas that tend to have the highest poverty rates in our country. LSC's grantees work to provide on-the-ground legal assistance to well over a million Americans annually: veterans struggling to access their benefits, seniors who have been defrauded, children in the foster system, renters facing eviction, victims of domestic violence, farmers struggling financially, individuals facing substance addiction, victims of weather-related events . . . the list is long and growing, but the legal needs of millions of Americans continue to be unmet due to a history of chronic underfunding. In fact, 50% of eligible clients are turned away each year

due to lack of resources. It is imperative now more than ever that Congress heeds this call to increase financial support for LSC.

As attorneys and attorneys general, we share a profound belief in our nation's promise of equal access to justice. We hope that you too will prioritize this basic principle of our legal system by supporting robust funding for LSC's vital work in delivering legal services to residents who need it most. We thank you in advance for your commitment to LSC's mission.

The four co-sponsors of this letter – the District of Columbia, Massachusetts, Oklahoma, and Tennessee – are joined by the undersigned attorneys general across the U.S. states and its territories.
